
- ▶ The Vision Team was charged as follows:



- ▶ ECONOMY
- Population in 2015 was 38,000
- ► Median Age is 31.5
- Majority is white with Hispanic next largest race
- Average household size is 3.13 people
- ▶ 81% speak English, 15% speak Spanish
- Majority of residents have some college experience to a degree
- Median household income is \$70,247
- ▶ 37.48% of the population affiliate with a religion

- **▶** POLITICS
- Conservative
- Adjacent to Travis County which is Liberal.
- Local government maintained as a nonpartisan body.
- Welcoming to many churches

▶ SPIRITUALITY

- Of the 37.5% that have an affiliation with some religion in Williamson County:
 - In descending order of adherents are Catholics, Baptists, Methodists, Non-denominationals, Mormons, Muslims, Lutherans, Church of Christ, Evangelical Lutherans, Hindus.
 - ▶ It seems that the parameters in which people are rating or qualifying a church are based on what the congregation offers and what their individual experience is like in that meeting.
 - Some look for the church to have their similar belief system; however, it is the experience that makes them return or not return.

▶ TECHNOLOGY

- ▶ Barna Group indicates 70% of Millennials read scripture from a mobile device, 54% are heavy users of online videos pertaining to faith, 56% use online search to scope out a church, 59% say they search for spiritual content on line, 38% fact-check sermons, 39% donate or contribute financially online. (2013 data)
- Leander ISD classrooms are equipped with computers, wireless laptops, a/v projection systems, document cameras, iPods and more.
- LCOC has a website, is on Facebook and Twitter, Email, Digital sign, Projection system for Paperless Hymnal, limited internet within building, online contribution through website.
- ▶ This area will see the greatest change in 10 years.

- ► SOCIAL/DEMOGRAPHICS
- ► Texas has the fastest-growing student population in the nation, and in Central Texas the student population is growing at twice that of the state.
- Growth is projected to occur primarily in the north/ northeastern portions of the Leader ISD district. (Leander and it's ETJ)

The teams were then to attempt to collect information on a projection of 10 years.

It is predicted by 2017, Texas will be predominantly Hispanic.

Texas is not only the focal point of immigration from other countries, but in-migration within the United States as well.

Strong economy and employment rate have about 200,000 people moving here from other states each year for the last 10 years.

Democrats are projected to outnumber Republicans by 2020.

Demographers predict in the next 20 to 25 years the population could go as high as 250,000.

- 44% of the population has a minimum of a bachelor degree, and some higher.
- New Austin Community College campus is being built in Leander
- As new technology is introduced, newer technology is being readied to replace it.
- Internet speed is steadily increasing affecting all areas of web usage such as social media, entertainment, banking, commerce, and online utility pay.
- Smart homes will allow control of access, temperature, appliance turn on and other areas from smart phones.
- Smart phones will have more apps to control or access whatever is needed.
- The internet is shrinking the world. People from opposite sides of the world can communicate instantly with no charge.
- Introduction of Artificial Intelligence, self-driven cars, flying planes, microchips embedded in humans, nano technology, drones and many more.

With this research data, the Vision Team requested input from the congregation.

Two sessions were held. The first on Saturday morning April 2 and the second on Sunday afternoon April 10. About 65 attended each session with some carry over from the elders and team members attending both sessions.

The April 2 session developed several conclusions in the form of questions. The top 3 were:

How do we intentionally transform ourselves as Christians to show others who Christ is and where He is so Christ becomes the priority for all?

How can we as a church and as individuals communicate to the community that we are a loving, welcoming family to which they can BELONG?

How do we shine our light to attract folks in our community, and still maintain being a Bible based church?

The April 10 session developed similar questions. The top three were:

How do we create a culture that is welcoming, loving, safe, and offers sense of belonging and what are we willing to sacrifice to make this happen?

How do we create a stimulating service for all ages (millennials, rugrats, etc.) that remains scriptural?

How can we most faithfully be a committed body of believers who remain true to the Bible?

Some of the items that received a lot of attention were:

- True to the Bible—Taught and practiced
- Teachers motivated and trained
- Place of community, welcoming, belonging for diverse people
- Committed to Leander body
- Sharing Christ Looking outward
- All ages fully involved and respected. Gifts being used.
- Uplifting Worship and Singing
- Facilities need improvement
- Active Youth/Children's Program

Following the two sessions the Vision Team met to consider the congregational input. The following was developed:




